Favorable Decision
Upheld in
Discrimination Case

The Massachusetts Commission against Discrimination recently upheld a 2011 decision in favor of Legal Advocacy Fund-supported plaintiff Associate Professor Lulu Sun, concluding that the University of Massachusetts, Dartmouth, engaged in unlawful discrimination in denying Sun, an English professor, a promotion.

Title IX Turns 42!

Although we've made great progress with 42 years of Title IX, today's athletes need your help to break down a significant barrier that still remains: a lack of information.

Unlike colleges, high schools are <u>not</u> required to release data on equity in sports, making it difficult for parents, students, and high schools to determine if boys and girls have equal access to athletic opportunities.

The High School Data Transparency
Act (H.R. 455/S. 217) would address this
gap by requiring high schools to report basic
data on the number of female and male
students in their athletic programs and the
expenditures made for their sports teams.

Title IX and the Clery Act laws work together to protect students from sexual violence

<u>Title IX</u> is an invaluable tool to fight campus sexual assault. Title IX prohibits sex discrimination in education, including protecting students from sexual harassment in all of a school's programs or activities. Although Title IX is too often known only for its role in women's sports, the law also requires schools to eliminate sexual harassment and sexual violence, prevent its recurrence, and address its effects on campus. Title IX also provides the mechanism through which students can file a complaint if schools do not act accordingly.

Last year, the Violence Against Women Act reauthorization updated the <u>Clery Act</u>, and just this week the U.S. Department of Education took the next step in the process of finalizing the new regulations. The regulations will clarify the updated law, which requires schools to make their campus disciplinary processes more transparent, to

train and educate students as well as faculty and staff, and to update sexual assault policies. The updates to the Clery Act also call for gathering new statistics, starting this year, about domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

The newly created website **NotAlone.gov** details for students what responsibilities schools have under Title IX to respond to sexual violence and aims to ensure that students know their rights and how to file a complaint.
